

Creating a Common Agenda

- In general, do you feel your local and county elected and appointed officials support the library? How do you know this?
- Do you feel other library stakeholders (e.g., parents, students, teachers, business owners, seniors) support the library? How do you know this?
- Are any of your key stakeholders currently involved (as volunteers or trustees) with the library or any of its programs? Are any of their family members involved?

It's human nature

- People/officials/legislators do things for their reasons, not yours.
- People/officials/legislators pay attention to the things that they love and value.

Identifying the priorities that others have on their agenda

The folks who have power over our existence

- Municipal/village councils (mayor, administrator, council members)
- County board of supervisors (county exec, supervisors)
- State senators and representatives, Governor
- Federal senators and representatives, President

How to Bridge the Agenda Gap

- □ Provide credible, relevant information to build trust.
- Know the mission, goals, and priorities of your decision-makers.
- □ Find points of alignment for library and community agendas, i.e., local, county, state government.
- Understand how your decision-makers perceive public opinion.

Inside the Library:

Current & new library board members

What to do & talk about

- Provide a tour of the library
- Share your philosophy of service &
- Describe what you hope to accomplish as Director (shared vision)
- Ask about their reason(s) for serving/wanting to serve on the library board
- Their sense of the library's priorities
- [+ new member orientation]

Inside the Library: Future library board members

- Recruit (input from staff, officials)
- Advertise (invitation to serve, position description; see page 15-16 of syllabus)
- Strive for diversity (age, gender, race & ethnicity, residence, income, education, employment)
- Mayor/village president makes the appointments but always provide a list of names from which to choose.

Inside the Library Friends of the Library Board

- Follow the general format (with board members)
- □ Tour, discussion +
- Advocacy education
- □ Recruitment issues
- Conduit to Library Board

Local Officials

What to do & talk about

- Call each person and set up an individual appointment.
- Provide a tour of the library
- Share your philosophy of service
- What you hope to accomplish (working with the board and staff) as Director, i.e. shared vision.
- Ask about their reason(s) for serving (in their respective capacities).
 - People do things for their own reasons, not yours.
- Their sense of the community's priorities
 - (Middleton 1986: Where is new library on list?)
 - People pay attention to the things they love and value.

Questions to ask candidates for office / local & county officials

- What made you decide to run for office? (The answer may allow your to learn if a particular official has a big-picture view or a narrow-interest agenda.)
- What are the most important issues facing our county/city/village over the next few years?
- (And if a statement about libraries hasn't been offered unprompted.) Where do you place libraries on your list of priorities?

The Goals You Want to Achieve

- Become known on a first-name basis (not just by a generic title)
- Get a sense of community & library priorities
- Identify your allies and adversaries

Follow the same procedure at the county level

- County executive (chief of staff or key staff members)
- County board supervisors who represent library's service area
- Chair of finance/personnel committee(s)
- Township officials

- Executive Director
- Board of Directors
- Member Gatherings

Chamber of Commerce

- Executive Director as portal to the business community
- Connections among Chamber, Library, and Friends Boards (+volunteer links)
- Participation in Chamber events (breakfast meetings, after-work gatherings, committees)

- Library Board Liaison

- Reading Specialists

- Superintendent's views of libraries in general and library cooperation in particular.
